



Dr. Adrienne Martinez-Hollingsworth is a Latina registered nurse and health services researcher with 24 years of experience working in safety net communities across Southern California. Her work explores patient-provider trust building among nurses and physicians who reflect the communities they serve. Inventor of The Burnout Dyad, Dr. Martinez-Hollingsworth uses novel, art-based and mixed-method approaches to uncover critical provider needs to support the healthcare workforce. She has been a member of NAHN since 2014, currently serves on the Board of Directors for her local NAHN chapter in Los Angeles, and is a member of the National Board of Directors for NAHN.

Featured Speaker: Katrina "Kat" Ascenio-Holmes, CNOR, BSN, MHA





Dra. Perea-Ryan has spent over 30 years serving Hispanic cannery and farm workers in California's underserved Central Valley, first as a nurse and later as a Family Nurse Practitioner. As a professor at Stanislaus State, she leads curriculum development, creates internship opportunities, and teaches courses on topics such as Health Disparities and Transcultural Nursing. Her research centers on reducing health disparities among farm workers and promoting the inclusion of social and environmental determinants in healthcare, education, and policy.

A former NICU nurse with more than a decade of bedside experience, she brings practical insight to designing tools and resources that uplift clinician wellbeing and career growth; she is also a Johnson & Johnson Nursing Innovation Fellow and the San Joaquin Valley Nursing Leadership Coalition's 2021 Nurse of the Year for Innovation in Clinical Practice. The first Hispanic nurse to have a company backed by Silicon Valley's Y Combinator, she speaks on healthcare innovation and equity and proudly advocates for the people who keep our health system running.

Featured Speaker: Dra Kathleen Rindahl



Dra. Rindahl is an Assistant Professor and Chair of the School of Nursing at Fresno State University. A U.S. Navy veteran and former hospital corpsman, her military service on a Rapid Medical Deployment Force ignited her lifelong passion for community health. Before transitioning to academia, Dra Rindahl spent a decade as a Migrant Health and Public Health Nurse with the Fresno County Office of Education, delivering care to rural communities from a 60-foot mobile health trailer. In 2015, she founded Fresno State's Mobile Health Program, which continues to provide essential healthcare services to underserved populations across the region.

Dra. Hickson is a Critical Care Nurse Practitioner at the University of California, San Francisco, and a passionate DEI Champion, committed to advancing workplace diversity, provider concordance, and advancing the nurse role across California. She is a vocal proponent of political engagement in nursing and leads policy reform efforts at the local, state, and national levels. Dra. Hickson is particularly recognized for her legislative advocacy around the need for accurate Spanish translation of the Nurse Practitioner title. She serves on several boards, including the NAHN National Board of Directors as Policy and Advocacy Chair, and is the incoming President of the San Francisco Bay Area NAHN Chapter.

At UCSF, she chairs the APP Advisory Board, representing over 1,1000 Advanced Practice Providers. She serves on the California Association for Nurse Practitioners' Health Policy & Practice Committee and as Co-Legislative Chair for the SF Bay Area CANP Chapter.
